Older Adults Make the Grade

exams, term papers, pop quizzes, and being called on in class without warning. Does the mention of these school-related realities make your heart race, muscles tighten, and palms sweat?

Now imagine you can attend classes and simply sit back, listen, and ponder. Learn without regard for entrance into college or graduate school, your GPA, or career advancement.

Learning for the sake of learning—that's the beauty of attending or auditing classes as an older adult. And just one of the several benefits of participating in classes later in life.

Joan Ingersoll, director of Weston's Council on Aging (COA), lists many other advantages: the opportunity to pursue new or dive deeper into long-held interests; engage regularly with people; create new connections and friendships; keep the mind engaged and active; maintain curiousity and openness; increase feelings of wellbeing, confidence, and purpose; and decrease loneliness, isolation, and boredom. Deborah Greenwood, Wellesley COA's director of senior services, sums up the benefits this way: "Maintaining senior health is about far more than preventing or treating issues. Keeping seniors active and socially engaged post retirement can help them lead long and productive lives."

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Dr. Ipsit Vahia, MD, geriatric psychiatrist, clinician, and researcher who heads the Technology and Aging Laboratory at McLean Hospital underscores the importance of older adults taking classes. He writes in the Harvard Health Blog: "When you exercise, you engage your muscles to help improve overall health. The same concept applies to the brain. You need to exercise it with new challenges to keep it healthy. The process of learning and acquiring new information and experiences, like through structured classes, can stimulate that process."

Fortunately, local seniors have a range of options available to them and can pick ones that suit their lifestyle and their priorities. Choices

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include one-time lectures and ongoing classes offered by adult community education programs, councils on aging, lifelong learning institutes, area colleges, houses of worship, senior living facilities, and more—in person or online; for a fee or for free.

Wellesley and Weston Councils on Aging Programming

The Towns of Weston and Wellesley Councils on Aging (COAs) each host an array of learning opportunities—both free and for a fee, over Zoom and in person.

Wellesley's COA offers lifelong learning classes, book discussions, technology assistance, lectures, and more. Topics range from current events to world history to Shakespeare. Priority is given to residents 60 years or older. If space permits, non-residents 60 years old or over are welcome.

"I've lived in Weston for 40 years, the first 25 years I was enmeshed in the corporate world. So when I retired, I faced a dilemma: we hadn't raised children in town, didn't belong to local organizations or a church, and our families and close friends were scattered across the country. How to begin anew as a senior with no local connections? I thank my lucky stars that I signed up for a watercolor class at the Council on Aging. One course led to another and then a variety of activities. I developed new interests and made wonderful friends. I was delighted to discover I could offer something in return leading classes in handwriting analysis, polymer clay, and short stories, and serving as a front desk volunteer and as a member of the Arts Council." Any resident of Weston 60 years or older is eligible to participate in Weston's COA in-person or online programming. Typical offerings include conversational Spanish; lectures about artists, historical figures, destinations around the world, current events; and health-related topics such as managing arthritis and communication strategies for dementia and Alzheimer's disease. Programs are free, other than those that involve trips, meals, or supplies.

Wellesley-Weston Lifetime Learning

Wellesley-Weston Lifetime Learning (WWLL) is the second oldest lifetime learning organization in the country and one of the few not affiliated with an institution of higher education. The nonprofit was started in 1976 to provide "intellectual stimulation, vigorous discussion, and good fellowship." WWLL is

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entirely staffed and run by volunteers and open to seniors wherever they reside.

Typically, about 250 seniors from Wellesley, Weston, Natick, Needham, Newton and 20 other towns attend lectures taught by professionals from Massachusetts and beyond. Topics range from current affairs, science, the arts, history, aging, and more. Most lectures are held on Zoom on Mondays from 10:00 to 11:00 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. over an eight-to-10-week period each spring and fall. There is a \$25 per person/per semester registration fee regardless of how many courses are taken.

Lifelong Learning at

Regis College (LLARC)

LLARC is a membership organizations for older adults from any town interested in "expanding their minds in a relaxed, welcoming, and sociable environment." The nonprofit offers an array of 10-week study groups on Mondays through Thursdays, some in person at Regis College, others remote on Zoom, as well as a Thursday in-person Lunch, Listen, and Learn series followed by a brown-bag lunch. There is a \$75 annual membership fee for Lunch, Listen and Learn, Glee Club, access to Regis College Library, discount at Regis Fine Arts Center, and eligibility to enroll in up to four study groups each semester—which requires an additional cost of \$200 per semester.

Wellesley College and Babson College Audit Programs

A few older adults can "go back to college" by auditing classes at local schools when space permits.

Wellesley College reinstated its auditor program in the fall of 2023. Residents of the Town of Wellesley who are age 60 and older (as well as alumnae, current full-time employees and their spouses, current parttime employees, and retired employees of the college who retired at age 60 or older with a minimum of 10 years of service at the college) are eligible to audit one course in a fall or spring semester class.

Resident auditors are charged a \$250 administrative fee. Registration is first-come, first-served. Even if auditors would like to, they may not submit written work or take quizzes, tests, or exams. Unless the professor specifies otherwise, auditors may not participate in classroom discussions.

Babson College offers residents of the Town of Wellesley or Needham who are age 65 or older (as well as alumni aged 65 or older) the opportunity to audit one course per semester at Babson College for no cost or fees. Only two auditors are allowed per course that has space available. Auditors are fully engaged in classroom deliverables.

MassBay Community College MassReconnect Program

If you don't have a college degree and are game for exams, papers, and all the requirements of a degree program—without the tuition—the new MassReconnect program could be for you. Older adults can now earn an associate degree or professional certificate for free at MassBay or any public community college in the state thanks to a scholarship program introduced by the Healey-Driscoll administration that went into effect in fall of 2023. MassReconnect is for Massachusetts residents 25 years or older with a high school diploma but no higher education who enroll in at least six credits per semester in a degree
